Message from Mallory

Create an Indoor Garden this Winter

For a breath of spring in the depths of winter, it's hard to beat a pot of flowering paperwhite narcissus. Paper-white narcissus are easy and foolproof enough that forcing them to flower is a good project even for the newest gardener and they make a beautiful decoration for your home

or as a gift.



Purchase the bulbs anytime after October 1 from a reputable nursery or garden center. With paper-whites it is a good idea not to set them out all at once. Space out the time between when you set them out to every 10 days and then your blooms will not come all at once, then you will have blooms from December to Spring. Once you do set out the paper-white bulbs you should begin to see flowers in 4-6 weeks. Although the term "forcing" is used when speaking of

paperwhites in our area of the Southeast it might be better expressed as "fooling" since what you really do is fool the bulb into thinking winter is over and it is time to bloom. Paper-whites are the easiest indoor bulbs to force or "fool", and are usually available at local nurseries and home im-

provement centers, or through catalogs.

Paperwhites are best grown in a shallow pot or bowl with no drainage holes in the bottom and best of all, no soil is require, only water. You will start by finding a container and filling the bottom with gravel, small stones, or even fun things like colored beads or marbles (there are tons of creative options). Then place as many paper-white bulbs as will fit on top of the gravel, with the pointed side up. Place the bulbs down in the gravel or marbles so that they act as support to hold the bulbs in place, but do not bury the bulbs. You want at least half of the bulb exposed. Add water up to the base of the bulbs and maintain it at this level making sure that the bulb does not stay in the water once it begins to send out roots or the bulb will rot. Place the container in a cool, dark place for two weeks before placing it in a warm, sunny location. Add water as evaporation and root uptake deplete the supply. Avoid disturbing the bulbs after planting as the roots are fragile. There may be a slight difference in flower timing depending on the temperatures. Higher temperatures encourage weak growth and poor flowering. Bulbs immediately placed at a temperature of 60-70°F will bloom in about 6 weeks.

For later bloom you can delay setting them out or the pot can be maintained at 50°F, and then moved to the higher temperature. For late spring bloom, the bulbs can be stored dry at 50°F. When potted, these will usually bloom in 3-4 weeks. The cooler the room, the longer it will take the bulbs to flower and the longer they will remain in bloom. Paper-white narcissus are tender bulbs that will not overwinter outdoors easily and they may be forced only once.

After the foliage begins to turn yellow, discard the bulbs and the potting medium (Gravel or marbles may be washed and stored and used again next year). Wash containers immediately and thoroughly to remove salts and lime deposits and hopefully by now, warmer temperatures and outdoor spring flowers have arrived!


DECEMBER MINUTES

The December CAMGA meeting was held December 17, 2013 at Mulder Memorial United Methodist Church, Wetumpka, Alabama. Candy Jones called the meeting to order at 10:20 a.m.

The November minutes were accepted as written. Linda Griebel made the first motion, Sandy Casey made the second, and it was carried by all present.

Becky Ashurst gave the treasurer's report for November 2013. The balance as of October 31 was \$8983.85. Income was \$552 from the Christmas lunch, \$780 from dues, \$10



Ann Hill announced that members wanting a different photo in next year's directory should send her one; alternatively, she could take a photo with her camera at the meeting.

Candy Jones welcomed visitors and members to the Christmas luncheon and recognized Mallory and Hudson Kelley.

Linda Griebel reported the following: (1) The Governor's Mansion will continue to be a volunteer site for those wishing to participate. Volunteers should contact Jane McCarthy by noon the Friday prior to the workday in order to get their names on the list for clearance through security. There will be a sign-up sheet at the January meeting for a CAMGA workday at the Mansion. Amanda Borden has agreed to be the liaison with the Governor's Mansion. (2) The Beginning Bonsai class, scheduled for February 26, will be taught by Rhona Watson. Cost is \$18, and the class is limited to 20. All materials will be provided; the plant will be a small juniper. If more than 20 people are interested, the Projects Committee will try to offer another class later. (3) The annual Master Gardener plant swap will be October 3, 10 a.m.-noon. Participants should get five plants ready for the swap. (4) The public plant swap at the Recycle Center will be in April. (5) The Projects Committee will host a leaf birdbath project at the end of the summer. (6) Members who are approached about a possible project for CAMGA should talk to Linda or Catese Chaffee (new Projects Committee chair) about it.

Mary McCroan thanked members for their help--through financial contribution and/or hands-on work--with the three big projects in the Learning Gardens: (1) The water and shade garden, (2) the irrigation system, and (3) the installation of ground cloth to reduce maintenance. Mary welcomed members to come to the gardens to see what has been done and learn how to do it.

Carol Rattan reported on upcoming programs: (1) January - Jane Mobley, Heirloom Gardens; (2) February – Patrick Cook, Attracting Songbirds; (3) March – Mary McCroan, Irrigation; (4) May – visit to Jim Scott's garden; (5) June, visit to Young's Plant Farm. Carol will book the rest of the year as we go along. Candy Jones thanked Carol for all her good work in planning programs.

Phil Easter reported that he plans to meet with Mallory Kelley to set up CAMGA's appearances on WSFA-TV for next year.

Rhona Watson, Reach for the Stars coordinator, announced that the first week in January she would pull volunteer reports from "Lifetime Volunteer Hours" on the ACES reporting site. Rhona requested that members look online to make sure their reports are accurate and call her if there are problems. Active members should give a minimum of 25 CEU and/or volunteer hours per year. Candy Jones thanked Rhona for her work

and urged members to log in their hours because ACES depends on this for funding. She reminded members that Anida Wishnietsky offers assistance with the service reporting website.

Carol Rattan welcomed everyone to Mulder UMC and gave instructions regarding logistics for the lunch to follow. Santa wished everyone JOY in their Christmas: J – Jesus, O – Others, Y – You, in that order.

Candy Jones offered the following: (1) She commended Mary Long for the beautiful new format of the newsletter. (2) The slideshow at the meeting featured photos Candy had taken on various Master Gardener excursions, such as trips to Aldridge Gardens and Jim Scott's gardens. (3) She thanked Phil Easter and Rosemary Mobley for the great job they did on the December Lunch and Learn, and she urged members to attend future Lunch and Learns and bring friends. Charlotte Hall and Sandi Adkison will be co-chairing the Lunch and Learn program next year, and Carla McCune and Debbie Kelso are regular volunteers.

Mallory Kelley thanked everyone who contributed to the Lunch and Learn program during the past year. Charlotte Hall collected email addresses of all attendees and emailed them invitations to upcoming Lunch and Learns. Mallory recommended that members distribute Lunch and Learn schedule postcards and bring people with them to a program; it is a good draw for the intern class and keeps CAMGA's name out there.

Candy Jones thanked CAMGA for their support of the Elmore County Food Pantry. Bob Brown began offering support when he was CAMGA president, and the practice has continued. Candy recognized those who had helped set up and decorate for the Christmas luncheon: Charlotte Hall, Carla McCune, Sharon Potts, Bob and Becky Brown, Carol Rattan, and Rosemary Mobley. Members added from the floor that Candy had also helped.

Phil Easter discussed a proposed memorial for Fred Evans. Fred was a past president of both AMGA and CAMGA. It was through Fred that CAMGA became active at Lanark. Maria Pacheco-West has been working for several months to have a small patio/terrace at Lanark designated in memory of Fred. The ultimate vision is to have two teak benches and two chairs in that area. Phil requested a motion that CAMGA donate \$450 for one bench in Fred's memory, with said memorial denoted by a plaque to be donated. Rhona Watson made the first motion, Tom Jaworowski made the second, and it was carried by all present.

Phil added that there would be a dedication ceremony later and that individuals could contribute additional money that could be used to purchase other furniture. Contributions should be made payable to Alabama Wildlife Federation (AWF), with a memo designating them as memorials to Fred Evans.

Candy Jones commented that she was pleased and honored to have served as CAMGA's president and recognized President-elect Linda Griebel. Candy turned the floor over to Nominating Committee chair Gale Wheeler-Leonard, who administered the oath of office to the 2014 officers: President – Linda Griebel; Vice-President – Carol Rattan; Secretary – Rosemary Mobley; Treasurer – Becky Ashurst; and Advisory Council Representative Sally L'Abbe.

Linda Griebel announced that her first duty as the new president was to commend Candy Jones on the tremendous job she had done for CAMGA for the past three years. Candy presented Linda with the CAMGA trowel (developed by Art Wilkerson in 1996), which was embellished with a plaque engraved with names of CAMGA presidents, with Linda's being the newest.

At 11:03 a.m., the business meeting was adjourned, and lunch was served. Following the meal, door prizes were awarded. Sixty-eight people attended.
