#### **Message from Mallory**

#### Keeping Poinsettias Healthy through the Holidays

The very popular Christmas plant, poinsettias are actually native to Mexico and can be seen growing along the roadsides in their native habitat reaching heights of 6-8 feet tall, but keeping one alive and healthy looking in a pot for 1-2 months in the state of Alabama can often times be a challenge.

The poinsettia made its way to the United States through the United States Ambassador to Mexico, Joel Poinesett. He took cuttings from the plant on one of his visits and sent them back to South Carolina where the climate was just warm enough to allow the plants to survive.

Poinsettias in Mexico bloom in late fall through early winter, but in order for them to bloom during our holiday season north of the border, special care must be taken.

The part of the plant often referred to as the "blooms" or "flowers" of the poinsettia are actually colored bracts, which are leaves that form at the base of the flowers. The flowers are the yellow structures, called cyathia, which the red bracts surround.

Even though the holiday season is when the poinsettias are in bloom, the cooler temperatures in the United States often times make it difficult to keep the plants alive and healthy.

Here are some tips for keeping your poinsettia healthy through the holiday season.

- Place plants in very bright, but indirect light. Southern windows with full sun exposure are not a good choice because of window drafts and temperature fluctuations.
- Try to keep plants far away for outdoor entrances as the sudden drafts of cool air are not good for the plants and will dry them out quickly.
- Keep the soil evenly moist, but not too wet. Too much moisture will kill a plant as quickly as not enough moisture. Do not al-



low the plants to dry out completely this will cause the bracts color to fade and leaves to begin to drop and it will be very difficult to rewet the soil in the pots.

- If when watering, the water immediately rushes through the plant and out the bottom then the plants were too dry and never allow water to stand in the tray as this will drowned the roots and kill the plant. Continue to empty the tray and slowly add more water until the plant is evenly moist and no water is collecting in the tray.
- Keeping the indoor temperature between 70-75 degrees in the day and 55-65 degrees at night is best.

Keeping poinsettias looking great throughout the holidays can be frustrating, but understanding what they like will allow them to last and look beautiful much longer.



# CAMGA Minutes November 16, 2021 Betty Plaster, Secretary Mulder Methodist Church

President Lynda Edwards welcomed members to the monthly meeting and Vice President Leslie Bingham introduced the speaker Jane McCarthy, Master Gardener. Jane gave a very informative program on how to make a Victorian kissing ball.

To make a Victorian kissing ball you will need the correct tools. These tools need to be sharp so holes can be made in apples or potatoes (using apples and potatoes helps to keep the leaves moist). Start designing your kissing ball by piercing the apple with a sharp tool and making a hanger for the ball. Cut greenery that will stay fresh a long time such as boxwood, holly, tea olive, magnolia, bay laurel or pittosporum leaves. When cutting the greenery remember to use pruning techniques. Using the sharp tools, pierce the apple and insert the leaves and mistletoe and then complete the ball using ribbon.

The Victorian kissing ball technique can also be used to make door wreaths, door hangers, or greenery arrangements for mantles. Usually, the potato is used for these decorations. Use your imagination when decorating the greenery by adding ribbons, dried flowers, or other natural Christmas decorations.

Matthew spoke on the creation of a farm center as a centennial gift from ALFA to its farm members. The center will be located on 526 acres at exit 212 of the Interstate 65 N. Plans include an expo hall, livestock barns, and arenas. The hope is to attract various entities to use the venue since it is centrally located in the state and can appeal to many areas of agriculture. AMGA has a new website address. Roger Clarke has been appointed Chairman of the Transformation Garden AMGA Committee. Roger will be contacting the president of each LMGA for money to fund a walking path for one end of the garden to the other. It will meander through sixteen acres of the Auburn campus/Transformation Garden.



So things going on in the Learning garden include winter veggies, garlic, and thinking about terminating annuals, cutting back perennials and general cleanup. We have done some propagation with the division of the Lemon Grass and cuttings of the Cuban Oregano that were planted last spring by Deb Kelso. The Lemongrass is an annual that is now over wintering (I hope, successfully) in our new greenhouse. The Cuban Oregano, is also not hardy in our area, and we hope it does well in the greenhouse.

summer and might provide inspiration for covering up a fence you don't like.






### Chicken to Greenhouse Conversion By: Mary McCroan



A small group of enthusiasts met in November to adapt an existing chicken house at our County Extension Office to a Greenhouse. If you want to visit and take a look, this project is located in the fenced area on the north side of the Extension Building.

Volunteers included Lee Borden, Mary McCroan, Candy Jones, Terry Chambliss and intern Sherri Lyn Davidson. We put on two layers of plastic, one on each side of the 2x4s the chicken house was constructed with. The plastic is a heavy gauge purchased from a greenhouse supply company.





We've installed a greenhouse heater for those cold nights. This was a little more expensive than getting an off-the-shelf model from Walmart, but it is designed to be protected from water splashing, has a nice wide base and we hope it will be safe and reliable. Amazon users gave it generally good ratings with a 4.7 out of 5. It does not have a feature where it can be set it to a certain temperature, so I'm playing with the knob to get it to stay in a "warm enough" range.

We also got a remote, wireless thermometer. Thanks to Lee Borden for doing the research. So far we've varied from 45 degrees to high 90s! But the current greenhouse occupants seem happy enough. If you want to take a look, download the Govee app, then login with my email (mary1@mccroan.com) and the password is CAMGA123.

I was asked if we could overwinter house plants and the answer is that I don't know. I want to try and keep the temps above 50, but sometimes it will probably drop down to 45 and I'm afraid a lot of houseplants my not survive. If you want to bring some houseplants as an experiment, give me a call at

334-312-0679. Right now I have some impatience, painted begonias, arborvitae fern, and lemon grass. We have room for more plants, and can also build more shelves. But you can't yell at me if we end up not controlling temps well enough to keep plants alive. This first winter, it is an experiment.



Shelving currently includes a small wood unit custom built from 2x2's--a fun and easy project. And some wire shelving from Lowes--at about \$100 for a 48" widex18" deepx72" inch high unit, this was cheaper than buying the wood for a similar size unit. The question is which will last longer. Will the wood rot first, or will the metal rust first. Inquiring minds will find out over time.
