Message from Mallory

Mallory Kelley Regional Extension Agent — Home Grounds,

May Garden Tips

Fruits and Nuts

- Continue spray program.
- Keep grass from around trees and strawberries.
 Peaches and apples can still be budded.

Shrubs

Newly planted shrubs need extra care now and in coming weeks.
 Do not spray with horticultural oils when the temperature is above 85 degrees F.

Lawns

- Start new lawns from seed.
- Call the Master Gardener Helpline at (877) 252-4769 to learn more about seasonal fertilizer use and proper mowing. Overfertilizing and overwatering lead to lawn problems.
- Wait until warm-season lawns are fully green before applying any fertilizers.
- Mow often (5 to 10 days) to remove just 1/3 the grass height at each mowing
- Apply 1 pound nitrogen per 1,000 square feet to all warm-season lawn types: bermudagrass, centipedegrass, St. Augustinegrass, and zoysiagrass (or wait until after dethatching).
 Dethatch warm-season lawns if needed. Check thatch layer, as in April. Water and fertilize after dethatching (1 pound nitrogen per 1,000 square feet).

Roses

- Spray or dust for insects and diseases.
- Fertilize monthly according to a soil test.
- Plant container-grown plants in flower.
 Prune climbing roses after the first big flush of flowering.

Annuals and Perennials

- Late plantings of bedding plants still have time to produce.
- Watch for insects on day lilies. Bulbs
- Summer bulbs started in containers may still be planted.
- Do not remove foliage from spring flowering bulbs.
 Do not let seedheads form on tulips and other spring flowering bulbs.

Miscellaneous

Mulch new shrub plantings if not already done.
 Monitor new landscape plantings of shrubs, trees, and turf. To establish healthy root systems, prevent them from drying out and water deeply.

Vegetable Seeds

- Whole state: Continue plantings of all April seeds across the state.
- Central and North: Add okra and southern peas to your garden.

Vegetable Transplants

- Whole state: Continue plantings of April transplant crops.
- Central and North: Plant certified sweet potato slips.



The meeting was held at Rhona's house. After admiring her gardens and beautiful bonsai creations, we met inside. Those present were Jane Mobley, Darlene Dixon, Rebecca Ridley, Michelle Sharpton, Rhona Watson and Terry Chambliss.

Rhona gave an update on the memorial brick project. The patio has been completed and she is working with the brick company for the color and size of the bricks for engraving.

There are 10 people signed up for Earth Day on April15th.

Our continued participation in the Community Market was discussed. There is a marked decrease in interest among the members and the public. It was decided to do it again on May 4th in order to promote the plant sale and intern class and make a decision as to continued participation after that.

Lanark Work Day was scheduled on Wednesday, May 17th from 8:30am-12:00pm.

Fertilizing and pruning the Presbyterian Church roses was scheduled on June 7th and August 23rd from 9-11:00am. Jane will purchase the fertilizer.

A Propagation Workshop at Extension was scheduled on June 15th from 8-11:00am. The participants will be propagating plants for themselves. Pots and soil will be available.

The Make & Take project will be on August 16th from 10:00am-12:00pm. Rebecca and Michelle will lead the workshop on lighted fairy wreathes. This will be practice for the Senior Project scheduled on October 20th from 9:30-11:30am.

The plant swap among members was scheduled during the CAMGA meeting on September 19th, however It was later pointed out that we have a guest speaker for the day. It was changed to the meeting in October at Lanark.

The remaining projects will be scheduled at a later date. Those include returning to Dr. Mitchell's house to cut the air layered camellias, the scarecrow, Christmas ornaments and sachet bags.

Learning Garden Report April 2023

The reconstruction of our Learning Garden is continuing:

- Our 2nd fence (of four) is close to completion and is looking as good as the first. Meticulous work by Jason Mattox, Darlene Dixon, Virginia Pruitt, Deb Kelso, Terry Chambliss and Candy Jones have assured that it will be straight, square and visually appealing as well as functional. Remaining work: the two shorter end fences, pergolas over the two gates, and moving one of the irrigation manifolds that is in the way of the new construction.
- Cheryl Fitzgerald, Bill Quails, Candy Jones and Terry Chambliss all worked on the new "keyhole" beds.
- Terry Chambliss arranged for delivery of some super-soil to fill up the new beds.
- We are working on a garden design to best use our new space to illustrate concepts and techniques for visiting gardeners.
- Amanda Borden designed and planted four beds to show use of rotation of crops in home gardens. And more recently, she is incorporating companion planting (such as basil and marigolds) around tomatoes.
- Some of the new beds will be used to group culinary herbs in one area.
- Deb Kelso is creating a design that will showcase herbs that were historically used medicinally by Native Americans and early settlers in times when modern medicines had not yet been invented and the nearest doctor might be a three days away by horseback.
- Jane Mobley has planted a few more plants for the pollinators in the Butterfly Garden.

Our spring/pre-sale workday was 24 April 2023. Participants included Terry Chambliss, Connie Willis, Jason Mattox, Ricky Hatcher, Rozanne Braswell, Rhona Watson, Sandy Rosamond, Mary McCroan, Darlene Dixon, Jane Mobley, and Virginia Pruitt. It was a smaller turnout than previous Spring cleanup days around the Extension, but I've noticed that post COVID participation in community activities is still far below pre-COVID levels.

We repaired the shed, removed some damaged elements from the pergola, built a little more fence, did some painting, killed some ants, and generally picked up and cleaned up around the gardens. The "wild" blackberry patch got some alien trees and bushes pruned out of it. And the frost damaged figs were trimmed up.

Super kudos to Virginia Pruitt. There was less to do on the workday because in early April, she almost single handedly turned the jungle that had formed in front of the Extension back into a garden.

Many of the plants that were propagated nurtured by the Learning Garden team over the winter are looking good. The pink yarrow is blooming and looking particularly attractive. Hopefully all will sell well. On the other hand, in spite of toasting the turmeric in the greenhouse for a month, I only have a few pots with baby shoots. Turmeric really likes to stay asleep until mid-June.
