



Let's Get in the Garden, Spring is Here!

The pecan tree leaves are sprouting and you know what that means...it's time to get in the garden! The good old southern pecan trees are the last tree to leaf out and this makes it a great indicator that the soil temperature is rising and the ground is ready to plant.

What to plant? The list is endless from cucurbits like squash, cucumber and zucchini to those in the night shade family like tomatoes, peppers and eggplant. Do your research on which are related to one another by family and make sure you rotate the different types into a new place in the garden each year. You may also want to wait a few more weeks for the soil to warm a little bit more for things like your peppers and especially okra as they really like it hot!

Now is also a great time to apply fresh mulch like pine bark or pine straw. Those are the most accessible and economical for where we live in Alabama. Either type works great, it just depends on your preference and location. The pine bark is usually more expensive, but lasts longer as it breaks down slower in the soil. Either way, whatever type of mulch you choose there are so many benefits it will add to your garden. It suppresses weeds, retains moisture in the soil which results in less watering, the mulch breaks down and adds organic matter and nutrients to the soil as well over time. Mulch also creates a great barrier between your plants leaves and the surface of the soil where many fungal spores live so it also helps prevent diseases. My only precaution, make sure when applying around trees and shrubs that you do not mound up several inches of mulch around the main stem of the plant. This will hold moisture into the bark of the plant and slowly cause rot and decline over time. Make sure that the flare of the tree or shrub at the ground is visible!

Now let's talk about pruning. If you have not pruned shrubs yet that needed a good cut, remember the "May Rule" or you may be removing this years buds resulting in a garden with no beautiful blooms. The "May Rule" is "If it blooms before May, prune it right after it blooms, if it blooms after May, it can be pruned when it is dormant in the fall or winter and you will have blooms again next year." On occasion, there can be some plants that are exceptions to this rule so always check before pruning to make sure.

It is also a great time of year to get your soil tested. Soil tests are available through the Alabama Cooperative Extension System and cost ten dollars. It is a good idea every few years to test the soil in your lawn to see what additional nutrients might be needed to improve the growth of your turf grass, but it is also a good idea to get a soil test if you are planting new shrubs. Plants like blueberries, camellias, and azaleas require a low pH as they need acidic soil to grow healthy. Testing if planting new shrubs, but also existing shrubs can help you improve the growth and health of your shrubs and trees.

April is a great time to plant a new lawn or to fertilize established lawns. Wait until May to plant lawns from seed. In May, water new lawns as needed to prevent drying. Keep established lawns actively growing by watering, fertilizing, and mowing and spray weeds in lawns with the proper herbicide. Begin fertilizing in April at 3-6 week intervals. Remember to mow regularly to avoid thatch buildup and water early in the morning with any overhead sprinkler systems so that the sun will dry the foliage of the grass and plants as soon as possible to help prevent diseases. The recommended amount of water for all established trees, shrubs and even turfgrasses is one inch per week throughout the year. If you are uncertain how much your irrigation system is putting out, use a rain gauge and timer and measure how long it takes to collect one inch of water. In addition, it is best to split that time into two applications per week to ensure a deeper soaking into the soil for better root development than to apply just a little bit of water every single day.

Jason Maddox introduced our guest speaker, Dani Carroll, ACES Regional Extension Agent, who talked to us about the advantages of winter sowing. Seeds can be direct sown or planted in covered containers in the late fall for cold stratification. The covered containers need to be put in a protected area so that they don't blow over. If planted in a container, check periodically for excess moisture which will cause the seeds to rot. In order to propagate roots in the winter, it must be done after the root is dormant.

The CAMGA, Inc. Monthly Business Meeting was called to order by President Cindy Augustine at 11:18 a.m. Twenty-nine (29) members signed the roster today.



After attending the L&L program on *Colorful Flowerbeds*, presented by Jane McCarthy, I ordered The <u>Flower Color Theory</u> book for our CAMGA collection. Jane gave us attendees information on the effects of a variety of color combinations for our containers and flower beds, as well as to consider the color of those beds against our foundations. 
