Look for insects and mites on your bulbs, corms, rhizomes and tubers You may be able to sow another round of basil, cucumbers, squash and southern peas.

Tips to Keep your Tomato Plants Healthy

The tomato is by far the most popular plant in the vegetable garden, but it can also be the most problematic. There are so many things to watch for when growing tomatoes to insure you have a healthy crop. Following the tips below will help keep your plants healthy the further we go into the hot and humid summer months.



Start with drip irrigation or hand watering only at the surface of the soil

to avoid splashing. Then prune all lower limbs off the tomatoes that are touching the soil and apply mulch.

Mulching your tomatoes keeps the plants moisture level consistent and will help prevent blossom end rot. Mulching helps control weeds where insects like to overwinter and eliminates there competition for the fertilizer you have applied. Mulch also creates a barrier between the plant leaves and the soil to help control many of the fungal problems that come from the surface of the ground.

Remove yellow and brown spotted leaves as soon as they appear and if not already, start a fungicide application to prevent "Early Blight." No tomato grower can avoid this problem so apply the PREVENTATIVE fungicide before the tomatoes get the fungus. Products with the active ingredients: Chlorothalonil, mancozeb or copper will control Early Blight.

Scout daily for insects. Go out and inspect for armyworms, fruit worms, hornworms along with stinkbugs. (The main insect problems on tomatoes). Products that contain Bacillus thuringensis (Bt) will work when the WORMS are young or use products containing carbaryl if the worms are larger. Another insecticide that will control stinkbugs and some of the other pests you may find is bifenthrin.

Don't wait until your plant has no more leave before you start your search for the hornworm. Scout today cause the plant may not be there tomorrow!!!! Weather challenges, garden insects, viral, fungal and bacterial problems, and disorders are all challenges we face with growing our own backyard tomatoes.

Like I said, they are the most popular vegetable/fruit to grow, but also the most problematic. If you have more questions on what may be affecting your tomato plants and what you can do to stop it.



CAMGA, Inc. Monthly Meeting Minutes June 17, 2025 Elmore County Extension Office By: Martha Rodgers, Secretary

Jason Maddox opened the meeting with our guest speaker, Enrique Grossi Bovi, Department of Horticulture at Auburn University. Enrique spoke to members about Best Management Practices for Growing Vegetables in Alabama. He started with the importance of planning and preparation emphasizing for instance that the closer water is to the plant root, the more efficient the production. He went on to discuss practices for sustainable gardening which included 1) fertilization using cover crops to replace nitrogen, phosphorus, and potassium; 2) pest and disease management through crop rotation and IPM; and 3) preserving soil health by minimizing soil disturbance, maximizing nutrients and soil structure through cover crops, and mulching.

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The CAMGA, Inc. Monthly Business Meeting was called to order by President Cindy Augustine at 11 a.m.

Jason reported two upcoming events in July. The Pollinator Census, July 22-23rd, and Tomato Tasting, July 30th. For the Pollinator Census, select any plant to observe for 15 minutes recording the type and number of pollinators observed. The Advanced Tomato Workshop will be at the Autauga County Extension Office in Autaugaville.

Cindy asked if there were any questions about last month's minutes. Connie moved that the minutes be approved. Candy seconded the motion. The minutes were approved. Martha had nothing to report.

Sherri Davidson gave the treasurer's report noting income for May. Katrina moved that the report be approved. Jason seconded and The Treasurer's Report was unanimously approved.

Mallory introduced Anne Clecker as a guest visitor and daughter of Cheryl Fitzgerald. Anne has enrolled in the Intern Program starting in August. Mallory also reported that 17 participants had already registered for the course starting August 14. She reminded everyone that there will be a class portal for participants to watch ahead of the class meetings. There will be guest speakers in person. Lunch will be in house each week. Classes will run from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. The first 7-8 weeks of classes will be at the Extension office and the remaining 5-7 will be in outdoor locations.

Candy reported that the Education Committee will have a "Wildlife in the Garden" workshop on August 27th. Committee members will meet briefly after the day's meeting.

Mary mentioned that more signage was needed in the Learning Gardens. She also reported that the irrigation system had been turned off since we are having so much rain. She invited members to harvest a few Misome leaves from the garden.

Robin reminded members that the upcoming intern class needed volunteers to provide food and to become mentors to the participants. She also suggested that we have a "Propagation Challenge" among members for the exchange of plants and possibly for the plant sale.
