# Message from Mallory Mallory Kelley Regional Extension Agent — Home Grounds, Gardens, & Home Pests

#### October Garden Calendar

#### Fruits and Nuts

- •Planting season for strawberries starts in south Alabama.
- •Clean up orchard area. Remove broken limbs, old fruit, and debris from orchard floor.

#### Shrubs

- •Plant new trees and shrubs in the landscape
- •Water when needed.
- •Note varieties of camellias and other landscape plants in bloom. Start mulching all shrubs that do not have a mulch.

#### Lawns

- •Perform a soil test to determine if limestone is recommended and apply anytime this fall.
- •If winter or spring weeds were a concern this year, apply pre-emergent herbicides.
- •Fertilize fescue lawns at 1 pound slow-release nitrogen per 1,000 square feet.

  As fall rain returns, monitor for fungal disease in fescue.

#### Roses

- •Continue insect and disease control practices.
- •New rose catalogs will be coming in.

  Study closely; add some new varieties to your list.

#### Annuals and Perennials

- •Visit flower shows and gardens.
- •List desirable varieties of mums.

  Clean up flower beds immediately after first killing frost. Plant half-hardy annuals, such as snapdragons.

#### Bulbs

• Plant tulip, hyacinth, daffodil, crocus, Dutch iris, anemone, and ranunculus. Watch planting depth. Dig caladiums; clean and store in a warm place.

Anita Reeves, Master Gardener from North Alabama, gave a presentation on Houseplant Gardening which included information on lighting, watering, nutrients, substrates, pots, environment and pests.

After a break for snacks and Rhonda Miles thanking those who brought food, the meeting was called to order at 11:35 a.m. by the Cindy Augustine.

Jason Mattox reviewed upcoming events:

Cindy Augustine asked for approval of last month's minutes. Candy Jones made a motion to accept the minutes as written. Beth Deaton seconded the motion. All attending voted for it and the motion was passed.

Cindy Augustine gave the treasurer's report for Sherri Davidson. She reviewed all deposits and withdrawals for July and August. Final July balance was \$26,475.96 and final August balance was \$26,746.78.

Candy Jones gave the education report. Wildlife in the Garden went well. The last public education seminar of the year will be Making Natural Wreaths on Nov 11<sup>th</sup>(2-4p.m.) at the Extension with a charge of \$15. Since the Square is not available, attendees will sign up ahead of time but pay when they arrive.

Mary McCroan gave the learning garden report. They are doing a lot of propagation to support the plant sale and some of the interns came to help.

Robin Snyder gave the membership report. The intern class is going well. There are 14 Elmore county interns. They finished six classes. Bud-Es should come to the outdoor sessions. Interns can only use volunteer hours, not CEUs and they are supposed to have half their volunteer hours (25) done by the end of classes (Nov 6th). Robin Synder will be updating the Annual Membership form which she will ask everyone to fill out when they pay their 2026 dues. Dues collection will begin October 1<sup>st</sup>. Current interns don't need to pay 2026 dues.

Anida Wishnietsky encouraged everyone keep their personal information up to date on the Service Reporting website under "my page." Making a change to the annual membership form does not update the website. Contact Anida if you need help with the website.

Darlene Branyon gave the publicity report. The most public interest comes from the CAMGA booth at the Wetumpka Farmers Market. The next one will be in October. The Dicken Christmas event also gets the word out. This year's will probably be the first weekend in December. We participated in the Wildlife Wetumpka Art Festival last year. We aren't doing it this year, but it is fun to attend. It will be on October 25<sup>th</sup> from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. in downtown Wetumpka.

Cindy Augustine gave the projects report as provided by Rebecca Ridley. Six people have signed up to help with the senior project on Sept 29<sup>th</sup> at the Wetumpka Senior Center, but more help would be welcome. Come at 9 a.m. if you want to help. The next project committee meeting will be on November 10<sup>th</sup> at 10 a.m. Interns are encouraged to attend.



#### The Serviceberry; Abundance and Reciprocity in the Natural World By: Robin Wall Kimmerer

From the #1 New York Times bestselling author of *Braiding Sweetgrass*, Robin Wall Kimmerer has written a short and thought-provoking book on the interconnectedness of nature, reciprocity and the "gift economy" of plants. Kimmerer draws her inspiration from the serviceberry tree. In her writings, Kimmerer, a Potawatomi botanist, bridges Western scientific approaches with indigenous ecological knowledge. She advocates for environmental ethics and argues against a market economy that has contributed to climate change while competing and hoarding produce for profit without reciprocity.



In *The Serviceberry*, Kimmerer's approach of reciprocity may seem too controversial and idealistic to some but using the service berry tree as a metaphor of a plant that distributes its wealth grabbed my attention. The tree share sits abundance of sweet juicy, berries to the needs of the natural community. Robin presents the "gift economy" as a model for consideration, much like the traditional way of thinking within indigenous

communities. They do not take more than they need, and they share their abundance with others, a sign of their wealth and gratitude. Gardeners naturally do this by having community gardens and sharing their abundant harvest with food banks. I like her quote, "Plants offer themselves to us, whether we are saints or sinners." After reading this book and attending classes on the value of our native trees, I have just purchased a serviceberry tree!
